County: Orange

1. Review Process

The Orange County Superintendent of Schools (Superintendent), on behalf of the Orange County Child Care and Development Planning Council (Council), solicited input from teen parent advocates and service providers to assist in the Cal-SAFE Plan (Plan) Annual Review. A meeting was convened on October 24, 2008 for school district and community representatives to review the Plan. (See Attachment 4 for invitees.) E-mail feedback was accepted from interested parties who could not attend the meeting.

The meeting engaged 19 participants in a forum discussion of the Cal-SAFE Plan items #4 - #8, which included educational alternatives, child care and development services for children of teen parents, service gaps and overlaps, and solutions to providing adequate support services for teen parents. Past reviews were consolidated and provided to each participant to help offer new ideas for the current review. Feedback and recommendations were recorded on poster paper and evaluated by the entire group.

Debbie Chitty, Orange County Health Care Agency, presented information on an Orange County Grand Jury investigation of teen pregnancy rates and programs that could assist teen parents in Orange County. Afterwards, teen parent advocates gave input to the creation of a resource guide for teen parents and provided information on appropriate marketing of those resources to the teen parent population.

The meeting allowed Cal-SAFE program coordinators to network with each other regarding best practices in their programs and for updates on local resources. Russell Brammer, Executive Director, RAISE Foundation, Orange County's official child abuse prevention council, presented resources on the dangers of co-sleeping with infants, offered free child abuse prevention training, and passed out fliers on free health clinics and family resource services for teen parents.

2. Updates/Modified Components of the Original Plan (continued)

The following statements represent anecdotal information as well as opinions of participants rather than documented, substantiated data. The information was discussed and updated to reflect with better accuracy the current needs for the Plan. Changes are reflected in **bold**.

QUESTION 4: Educational Alternatives for Pregnant and Parenting Teens

The following are additional barriers and limiting factors of concern.

- **Subsidized child care spaces are limited or waiting lists are long; Alternative Payment Programs, HeadStart, General Child Care programs. Since the children of teen parents cannot access full time child care, the teen parent cannot enroll in a full school program**
- Limited amount of transportation resources for teen parents and their children (i.e. bus passes, underage for driver's license, lack of vehicles, difficulty obtaining auto insurance) to get to school and medical/social services appointments creates major problems and contributes to absence from school
- Bus routes are not well coordinated with school site locations and instructional hours
- **Limited resources** for legal aid and mental health services
- Lack of resources and facilities for Cal-SAFE programs to open up additional classrooms and child care
- Limited awareness of **range of career preparation** at the community colleges
- **Some** comprehensive schools can be rigid and unaccommodating in structure for teen parents, not making allowances for child care needs or lactation
- Lack of programs focusing on early identification of teenagers or children at risk of becoming teen parents and no outreach for early intervention
- Lack of programs providing emotional support to parents/guardians of pregnant and parenting teenagers, capacity of current program (AFLP) is not adequate
- **Most districts are not aware of reasons why a student dropped out and do not inquire if the student is pregnant so that educational options can be explained**
- **The result of declining enrollment (diminishing ADA) can create fewer educational options for students. In some districts, expecting and parenting students may be retained in school setting when they should be referred to Cal-SAFE programs**

QUESTION 7: Gaps and Overlaps in Education and Support Services

Gaps

- Appropriate placement of middle school pregnant and parenting teens can be difficult
- Lack of awareness of Cal-SAFE programs and contacts among various school districts
- Domestic violence continues to be a major concern in all communities, including the teen parent community
- Lack of child care options for mildly ill children
- Challenge to provide resources for teen parents or their children who are English Learners
- Pregnant and parenting teen mothers have family issues and may have no safe or reasonable safe haven from these issues
- Difficult to contact reticent teen fathers and qualified male instructors as role models to encourage father's involvement with child
- Due to California High School Exit Exam requirements there are still pregnant and parenting teens who are not receiving high school diplomas, **needing more information on how to retake the test and once passed, how to access their diploma. Note: Cal-SAFE attendees were not aware of Valenzuela Settlement Legislation requirements**
- **Limited AFLP response to the high volume of referrals**
- **Not all resources for teen parents are offered countywide**
- **Cal-SAFE program contractors do not meet regularly to share resources and information.**

QUESTION 8: Proposed Strategies to Address Gaps and Overlaps in Educational and Support Services

- Increase the amount of support services in middle schools and increase their knowledge of the growing number of middle school aged pregnancies
- Circulate a resource list and find a meeting time where Cal-SAFE programs can meet more than one time per year. Have roving location for geographic convenience of all programs in Orange County and collaborate with public and private agencies to provide resources for agencies who interface with the teen parent population

QUESTION 8: Proposed Strategies to Address Gaps and Overlaps in Educational and Support Services (continued)

- Increase access and exposure of the importance of healthy relationships for teenagers and get more technical assistance for teen parent programs from community educators specializing in prevention of domestic violence
- Earmark special dollars or promote programs that offer mildly ill childcare
- Earmark more money or apply for additional funding to fulfill the needs of English Learners
- Encourage more shelters to create services for teenage mothers under the age of 18
- Programs can offer one on one teaching for teen fathers/fathers and work with colleges to encourage more male participation in the field of child development
- Continue to advocate for alternative methods to pass the requirements of the California High School Exit Exam, seek further technical assistance to help students pass and receive their high school diplomas, and **seek clarity on how to access diplomas and Valenzuela legislation**
- **Advocate for more valuable resources and funding for AFLP so that the program is equipped to handle the rising number of referrals or advocate for other case management options**
- **Recognize that need for resources is countywide and make resources available to all zip codes in the county**
- **Organize quarterly meetings, held at various Cal-SAFE sites throughout Orange County for Cal-SAFE contractors to thoroughly update Cal-SAFE plan, share resources and network on best practices**
